Introduction

Misook Song General/Artistic Director, media_city seoul 2000

With the ever accelerating development of information and media technology, stepping into the new millennium means more than merely passing a magical date. Rather, there is the unfolding of a terra incognita, the emergence of the digital world with all its unknowns and potentials. The city of Seoul, like many modern cities, is at a stage where there are repercussions and side effects from the ultrarapid urban development and economic growth of the last three decades, and therefore it has to confront various symptoms of malaise. Despite this, the city has determined to launch a cultural and artistic event that will both mark the beginning of the new era and predict new directions. This event, called the media-_city seoul festival, explores a number of media in all their diverse forms and genres. Such an endeavor seems long overdue in retrospect, and yet timely, as we face a world undergoing a dynamic transition from analogue to digital technology, from space of places to space of flows, rapidly substituting the medium is the message with the message is the medium.

With the recent digital revolution, media technology transcends time and space and helps break-or at least transgress-the boundaries of disparate areas of human activities and disciplines, challenging definitions of our thoughts, our lifestyles, and our cultural identities. The new cultural identities are claimed to be open, unstable, hybrid, and in constant flux. Predicated upon this paradigm shift, the programs of media_city seoul are designed to examine the points of contact and intersection among the arts, technology, and industry, ultimately seeking their common meeting ground and cooperation. As an event, media_city seoul stands as a signature of the cultural transformation before and after the change of the millennium. media_city seoul further attempts to

reach out to and engage various special-interest groups, different generations, and varying places.

The inaugural of *media_city seoul 2000*, the first of what is envisioned as a biennial event, takes place concurrently with the Asia-Europe Meeting in Seoul, and in 2002 the festival is planned to coincide with the World Cup series in Seoul. In this way, it is hoped that *media_city seoul* will become an international trademark for the city of Seoul, making it a true cosmopolis, a media metropolis.

city: between 0 and 1

The inaugural event of media_city seoul 2000 presents programs linked to an overall theme, that of "city: between 0 and 1". The two binary figures refer to the values recognized by a bit, the unit of all digital information; we adopted them to signify the futuristic vision of Seoul as it develops and expands beyond its spatial and temporal physical limitations. The numerical values zero and one equal the harmony between opposites, such as beginning and end, void and solid, soft and hard, yin and yang, circular and linear, chaos and cosmos, nonexistence and existence. The term "between" is a notion loaded with profound significance, alluding to the dynamics of the infinite possibilities and opportunities that may exist between the values, "zero" and "one". This allusion is founded upon a simple mathematical formula that proves that the number of numbers existing between zero and one is greater than those between one and infinity, suggesting an inherent mystery surrounding the value of zero. The number zero is for the most part interpreted synonymously with black hole or immeasurable potent energy of nothingness, according to recent theories developed by scientists in modern physics and thermodynamics. The symbolical value of zero appears frequently, however, in the ancient texts of Far Eastern thinkers and sages, which, especially in recent years, have had a tremendous impact on the lives of Koreans. Among the most widely read classical authors, it was the sixth-century B.C. Chinese philosopher Lao-tzu who recognized the importance of nothingness, an abstract notion equivalent to the value of zero. Indeed, he formulated his Taoist doctrine centered on the notion of nothingness. The state of nothingness is to Lao-tzu an a priori condition to reach the Great

Way, the tao. He wrote:

Thirty spokes converge on a single hub, but it is in the space where there is nothing that the usefulness of the cart lies.

Clay is molded to make a pot, but it is in the space where there is nothing that the usefulness of the clay pot lies.

Cut out doors and windows to make a room, but it is in the spaces where there is nothing that the usefulness of the room lies.

Therefore, benefit may be derived from something, but it is in nothing that we find usefulness.

-Lao-tzu, Tao-te-ching, book 1, chapter 11

For Lao-tzu, the thing (existence) was less important than nothingness, and the nothingness in this case is none other than empty space(s) existing in a wheel, a vessel, or a room. Although these empty spaces may appear useless, they have their definite functions; something can be useful only when nothing starts to operate. The something and nothing, and, by extension, the existence and nonexistence, referred to here are relative concepts that we can experience in the phenomenal world. Viewed from the epistemological context, however, it points to the interrelationships between origin (head) and end (tail) rather than to an irreconcilable dichotomy, as often claimed by Western thinkers. The following phrase found elsewhere in Lao-tzus text attests to that effect: All creatures under heaven are born from being; being is born from nonbeing (book 2, chap. 40).

Similar interpretations are found in the writings of several ancient Western mystics and occult theologians, Gnostics, Cabalists, and others who were preoccupied with the symbolism of numbers. To them, zero stands for nonbeing, symbolically associated with unity as its opposite and its reflection at the same time. It is also symbolic of the latent potential represented by the orphic egg, a generic form of chaos, and, because of its circular form, it also signifies

eternity, timeless time.

The entity called tao (the Way) by Lao-tzu is indescribable in laymen's language but should be translated as a primordial state of nothingness, the origin of the universe:

The Way gave birth to unity,

Unity gave birth to duality,

Duality gave birth to trinity,

Trinity gave birth to the myriad creatures.

The myriad creatures bear yin on their backs and embrace yang in their bosoms.

-Lao-tzu, Tao-te-ching, book 2, chapter 42

From tao originates thing; all things come into being as a result of tao. The process by which all things come into being is the process of division from one to many. By the same token, tao in Lao-tzus philosophy is the subject of the life of all things, while thing is a passive being yielded by it. Often, the One is synonymous and thus interchangeable with nothingness and the Way, tao; in other words, nothingness and the One are abstract concepts developed around tao, thus not to be taken too literally. In a similar context, the theme of media_city seoul should be read as parameters (trajectories), not only to signify future directions of such an event in the face of continuing digital revolution but also to revive traditional values preexisting in the depths of our mode of thinking and life principles.

The relevance of our theme to the classical Chinese text of Lao-tzu lies in the analogous notion of in-betweenness. As I have suggested, the term "between" signifies infinite possibilities and potentials. This notion is identical with that of void (not unlike nothingness or empty space), which is filled with invisible forces of ki, yin and yang, dynamic forces of life or of the universe that reside in and constantly activate all living organisms both animate and inanimate, obliterating the spatial and temporal boundaries that have been arbitrarily drawn by human beings.

Underlying these forces in life and in the universe is the idea of harmony and dynamic equilibrium between opposites. As Lao-tzu wrote: Being and nonbeing give birth to each other, / Difficult and easy complete each other, . . . / High and low fulfill each other, . . . / Front and back follow each other (Tao-te-ching, book 1, chap. 2). A parallel between classical Asian existential writings and contemporary Western cultural discourses related to transformations caused by the digital revolution may not be coincidental.

Recent innovations in media and information technology allow us to live in a sort of digital utopia, where physical limits of time and space are rapidly overcome, and where different cultures and regions become quickly remixed and interconnected, creating hybridity in split seconds with a boundless field of reactivation. Yet at the same time, unresolved socioeconomic problems, environmental issues, and moral hazards arising from urban explosion and material growth result in a commodity-oriented consumerism, furthering the gap and sense of alienation among different generations and social groups, changing this world into a sort of dystopia.

Recognizing both sides of the coin, media_city seoul has embarked on this ambitious international cultural event in the hopes of achieving a great spiritual harmony, of turning our uneasy world into a heterotopia. This can be achieved, we believe, by means of digital technology, in particular through the Internet. This year's exhibition, based on the theme "city: between 0 and 1", thus underscores the deliberate and strong intentions of the megalopolis of Seoul to search for new directions, a new ethos in an uncertain, yet exciting age.

Organization of Programs and Curators

In the conceptual phase of the media_city seoul 2000 project, my principal concerns were how to distinguish the event from other biennials and how to satisfy with limited resources and time the city's requirements and desired results. Fresh insights and ideas were suggested by the members of the planning committee of media_city seoul 2000, who agreed that the organization of the inaugural event should focus, foremost, upon laying the foundation, the infrastructure, for the following biennials in years to come. Further, it has been agreed that consideration should be

given to socially viable functions of the event and that *media_city seoul* should include programs to revive spirits and ideologies, much like the Werkbund or Bauhaus movements in Germany in the early part of the twentieth century. Finally, we determined to include in the program events that everyone can enjoy and in which everyone can participate. As a result, *media_city seoul 2000* incorporates three typologically different programs. The first and most visible program is devoted to media arts; it comprises 'Media Art 2000', 'City Vision/Clip City', and 'The Subway Project'. The second, titled 'Digital Alice', is an educational program for children between the ages of five and twelve, allowing them to experience the digital world through active participation and play. The third program, 'Media Entertainment', introduces new technologies and software programs developed by the multimedia entertainment industry.

The highlight of media_city seoul 2000 is multimedia art, which is divided among three different venues that are thematically interconnected without losing their individual character and autonomy. The rationale behind this spatial division is to go beyond the limits of the museum wall and provide an artistic experience in new and often unexpected locations and sites of Seoul. A confusion in our understanding of the true character of media art arises from the fact that it evolves around communication (media) technology, thus it relates closely to our everyday life. Indeed, media art was born out of the desire of avant-garde artists to incorporate ordinary life into their artistic expressions, even to emulate life, and vice versa. Based upon this premise, the public venues of media_city seoul 2000 not only complement the ordinary museum setting and broaden the range of our vision, but also challenge the social function of art that directly reaches out to the public, ultimately enhancing the role of the city itself as a medium.

While 'Media Art 2000', a typical museum exhibition, examines a broad spectrum of media art ranging from mixed-media installations to computer-generated works, dating from the inception of media art to the present, 'City Vision/Clip City' and 'The Subway Project' take place in public spaces and feature new works created specifically for this event. 'City Vision/Clip City' incorporates the large electronic signboards attached to high-rise buildings that are usually reserved for commercial and public advertisements. These screens are designed to attract

vehicular and pedestrian audiences alike. 'The Subway Project', on the other hand, engages thirteen subway stations used to facilitate daily transit for the majority of Seoulites. This public project is intended to entertain transit passengers with an array of site-specific works created by emerging local talents, transforming an otherwise dry and unattractive public arena into new and exciting artistic spaces.

The primary focus of the media art exhibited is given to the traditional white cube type of exhibition under the subtitle "escape", a word taken from escape/return, which is in turn derived from the key constituents of computer mechanisms. The notion of escape/return was suggested in the planning phase of the event as an alternative to the overall theme, "between 0 and 1", for it seems not only to describe quite nicely the turning point where we come out of the twentieth century into the new millennium and where old and new values, analogue and digital worlds, coexist, but it also alludes to the notion of a cyclical evolution of life that dictates our existence. After a lengthy discussion between the two curators-Barbara London of New York and Jeremy Millar from London-and me, we agreed on the single word "escape", as it also stands for electronic landscape, or e-scape.

London and Millar write:

"escape" features contemporary art that explores accelerated life as it plays out in the increasingly rewired, electronic landscape, and presents the latest artworks in various media, alongside works from previous decades, works that enabled the conception of those that followed. While for a long time art has been characterized by specific media, the nature of 'media art' itself is, curiously, rather too general, too ambiguous. As a term it is not well defined, and it is often lured by the spectacle of an entertainment- and commodity-driven popular culture and by consumerism. One thing for certain is that media art by its nature involves technology. Just as each technology is understood in relation to the one that came before, so is it important that contemporary media works be seen within a historical perspective. Seen in this context, media art becomes more

understandable in terms of the past and of a technologically determined future.

Based on this historical framework of media art, the curators delineated the subject with five relevant subthemes: virtuality; the material and the immaterial; social simulation; speed and space-time; and utopia/dystopia. Forty-five renowned artists, individuals and teams, from Korea and overseas were invited to participate. Among them are the Korean-born media guru and visionary Nam June Paik-who has created a centerpiece titled Market specially for the show-and Vito Acconci, Laurie Anderson and DanGraham whose works have not previously been seen in Korea despite their fame. Already familiar names such as Matthew Barney, Gary Hill, Joan Jonas, Bruce Nauman, Bill Viola, Tony Oursler, and Stan Douglas are included alongside relatively young and emerging artists and teams like Jane and Louise Wilson, Tacita Dean, Janet Cardiff and George Bures Miller, Valie Export, and Zhou Tiehai. From Korea are included the late Park Hyun Ki, Lee Bul, Kim Young Jin, and Park Chan Kyung, as well as a Korean-American, Michael Joo.

For the public venue called 'City Vision/Clip City', video clips have been created for the occasion by prominent video artists, architects/urban planners, and film directors. Featured on large electronic screens, these twenty- and fifty-second videos add an exciting cultural dimension and artistic luster to the already dynamic urban spaces. The curator/initiator for 'City Vision/Clip City' is Hans Ulrich Obrist, a well-known curator who is admired for his cutting-edge and transdisciplinarian notions, which constantly challenge and disrupt existing standards. He uses the subtitle Clip City, because the artists' clips are either images of cities or scenes of urban life, inserted and run like film clips between commercial advertisements. Among the invited artists are architects Zaha Hadid, the Madonna of the international architectural world, and Rem Koolhaas, this year's winner of the prestigious Pritzker Prize; the well-known film director Alexander Kluge and Chantal Akerman, a noted experimental-film diva; along with illustrious media-art personalities like Pipilotti Rist and Douglas Gordon. Two Korean artists are featured: the brilliant short film director Song Ilgon and Kim So Ra, a versatile young talent.

Ryu Byong Hak, curator of 'The Subway Project', has adopted the two interchangeable themes of "city: between 0 and 1" and "escape", noting their applicability to the ever repeating cycle of comings and goings of the subway line. He invited twenty-five teams, who were commissioned to produce permanent public furniture. All of the participating artists are emerging local talents, as mentioned previously, with the exception of the German photographer Bernd Halbherr. Among them are Lee Soo Kyong, Lee Jun Mok, Hong Myong Sup, SUPARTIST, Kim Ki Chol, Ham Kyong Ah, and Lee Dong Ki and Kang Young Min.

Though the curators worked independently of one another, the media-art exhibitions overall reflect an open dialogue and collaboration among the curators. The <code>media_city seoul</code> planning committee has benefited immensely from their expert knowledge and professional experiences, for which we are grateful. I also extend our gratitude to the participating institutions and individuals associated with them for their assistance and support in realizing this important event. My special thanks go to Sangsoo Ahn, the most illustrious graphic designer Korea has ever produced, who provided us with our strong and elegant logo. In addition, his unyielding support and advice have helped sustain me throughout, from the planning stage to the realization of the event.

Authors' Biographies

Lev Manovich is an artist, theorist, and critic of new media. In his writings, Manovich places new media within the larger context of modern visual culture, relating them to the histories of art and cinema. His book The Language of New Media will be published by The MIT Press this fall. His articles and projects are available at http://visarts.ucsd.edu/~manovich. Manovich is assistant professor in the Department of Visual Arts, University of California-San Diego, where he teaches studio and theory classes in the new media.

Barbara London, co-curator of escape, has built an essential context for the visionary statements being made internationally in media art by emerging talents, as well as by established artists such as Joan Jonas, Nam June Paik, Gary Hill, and Bill Viola. At The Museum of Modern Art, New York, where she is associate curator in the Department of Film and Video, she has organized more than 150 exhibitions, and assembled a unique collection of over one thousand videotapes and installations. Her web projects include www.moma.org/dot.jp, www.moma.org/internyet, and www.moma.org/stirfry. London has taught at New York University and the School of Visual Arts, and has published and lectured extensively.

Anne-Marie Duguet is professor at the U.F.R. d'Arts Plastiques et Sciences de l'Art at the University of Paris 1 (Pantheon-Sorbonne), where since 1992, she has headed the Research Center in Aesthetics of Cinema and Audiovisual Arts (C.R.E.C. A. A.). As an independent curator, Duguet has organized a number of exhibitions, including Jean-Christophe Averty-collages, decoupages (Espace Electra, Paris, 1991) and Thierry Kuntzel (Galerie nationale du Jeu de Paume, Paris, 1993), and co-curated the Biennale Artifices (St.-Denis), 1994, 1996). An art critic and member of AICA, Duguet is the author of several publications, including Video, la memoire au poing (Paris: Hachette, 1981), Jean-Christophe Averty (Paris: Dis-Voir, 1991), and articles on television, video, and new technologies. She is the director of anarchives, a series of CD-ROMs produced with artists, and co-author, with Antonio Muntadas, of the Interom Media Architecture Installations, anarchive no. 1, (Paris: Centre Georges Pompidou, 1999).

Paul D. Miller, a.k.a. DJ Spooky That Subliminal Kid, is a conceptual artist, writer, and musician who expresses himself through nearly every sensory outlet at his disposal. Standing at the crossroads of academic and pop culture, his moniker itself represents the combined inspiration of a sci-fi hero in a William S. Burroughs novel and an old commercial for Count Chocula. In his written work, visual creations, DJ sets, and musical pieces, Miller marries highbrow wit with an infectious sense of whimsy,fusing cultures and ideas for the digital age. As DJ Spooky That Subliminal Kid, Miller has recorded numerous CDs, remixing everyone from Steve Reich to Metallica.

Jeremy Millar, co-curator of escape, is an artist and curator living in Whitstable, England. He curated The Institute of Cultural Anxiety-Works from the Collection (ICA, London, 1994), Speed (Whitechapel Art Gallery and The Photographers' Gallery, both London, 1998), and Boris Mikhailov (2000), also at The Photographers' Gallery, where he was program organizer from 1995 until this year. Millar's publications include Confessions (London: Book Works, 1995), Airport, co-edited with Steven Bode (London: The Photographers' Gallery, in association with the Nederlands Foto Instituut, Rotterdam, and the Netherlands Design Institute, Amsterdam, 1997), and Speed-Visions of an Accelerated Age, co-edited with Michiel Schwartz (London: Whitechapel Art Gallery and The Photographers' Gallery, 1998).

Marian Pastor Roces is a critic and independent curator living in the Philippines. Published internationally, her writing is focused by her interest in clothes, cities, museums, the construction of minorities, and contemporary art that exercises skepticism about art and culture. She is currently working on the relation of nineteenth-century universal expositions to twentieth-century international art events.

Pastor Roces is also principal partner of TAO Management Corporation, which provides curatorial, cultural planning, design, and architectural services for museum, exhibition, and urban design projects. TAO approaches its projects as engagements in the politics of memory, and in reshaping notions of community.

Geert Lovink is a Dutch media theorist, Net critic, and activist, currently based in Canberra, Australia. Former editor of Mediamatic, he founded Internet projects such as the Digital City, Desk.nl, and the Nettime mailing-list circle. Lovink is also a co-organizer of conferences, including "The Next Five Minutes," and "Tulipomania: A Critique of the New Economy." Text archive: http://www.xs4all.nl~geert.

Hans Ulrich Obrist, curator of City Vision/Clip City, currently lives and works in Paris, where he has run the Programme Migrateurs at the Musee d'art moderne de la Ville de Paris since 1993. He founded the Migratory Museum Robert Walser and the Nano Museum, and has been a curator for the Museum in Progress, Vienna. Obrist has organized numerous exhibitions, including Christian Boltanski in the Library of the Monastery of St.-Gallen (1991), Do It (thirty versions thus far since 1994; U.S. tour 1997-2001), Cities on the Move, with Hou Hanru, Secession Vienna, and CAPC Bordeaux (1997), and Sogni/Dreams, with Francesco Bonami (Fondazione Rebaudengo, 1999).
